

SERVICES IN LINCOLNSHIRE FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE WITH

AN ADDITIONAL NEED/SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEED

AND/OR DISABILITY

We acknowledge that it can be difficult to know where to find appropriate help and support on the realisation that your child/ren has an additional need or disability.

This information booklet has therefore been devised to provide a starting point for you to access appropriate support for you and your family.

The various services and teams work in partnership to meet the need of children and young people with a range of additional needs including severe and complex physical and learning disabilities or who have a sensory impairment.

WHAT ARE SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND/OR DISABILITIES?

A child or young person has a Special Educational Need (SEN) if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her.

A child of compulsory school age or a young person has a learning difficulty or disability if he or she:

- has a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age, or
- has a disability which prevents or hinders him or her from making use of facilities of a kind generally provided for others of the same age in mainstream schools or mainstream post-16 institutions.

A child under compulsory school age has special educational needs if he or she is likely to fall within the definition above when they reach compulsory school age or would do so if special educational provision was not made for them.

Many children and young people who have SEN may have a disability under the Equality Act 2010 – that is '...a physical or mental impairment which has a long-term and

substantial adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities'.

This definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy, and cancer. Children and young people with such conditions do not necessarily have SEN, but there is a significant overlap between disabled children and young people and those with SEN. Where a disabled child or young person requires special educational provision they will also be covered by the SEN definition.



LINCOLNSHIRE'S LOCAL OFFER

The Local Offer is part of the Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) reforms from the Children and Families Act 2014.

There are two main purposes for the Local Offer:

- 1. to improve information about services and provision available for families, children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, and to make it easier for all families to find this information by making it available in one place.
- 2. that by working directly with families, children and young people on developing the Local Offer, Local Authorities and Health partners can improve provision.

Lincolnshire's Local Offer includes leisure and activity providers, health and care services, education providers and support groups.

Who is it for?

The Local Offer is for children and young people aged 0-25 with special educational needs and/or disabilities, and their families.

It will also help professionals working with families to find the right information.

Where can I find it?

You can find a wide variety of information and signposting on the Local Offer website, including information about the organisations listed within this booklet, where to find help and support regarding educational issues, health, social care, and links to local activities and support networks.

The Local Offer is available on-line on the Family Services Directory but you can also contact either the Family Information Service or LIAISE Information, Advice and Support Service and they will help you find what you need, or if you need additional support with the website.

PROFESSIONAL ADVICE AND SUPPORT



4ALL - LINCOLNSHIRE CHILDREN'S DISABILITY REGISTER

4All Children's Disability Register for children and young people aged 0-25 with a disability and/or additional needs in Lincolnshire.

Registering your child on Lincolnshire's Children's Disability Register helps us identify and plan for the needs of children and young people with disabilities, their parents and carers.

The register also operates as a contact list to provide information and consultation about short break opportunities, funded by Lincolnshire County Council, through the Lincolnshire Short Breaks for Disabled Children Team.

Contact the Families Information Service on *0800 195 1635* if you're not sure if your child is eligible for the register or if you need help with:

queries relating to disability/additional needs other family issues ranging from childcare to benefits, leisure to support groups

Registration is voluntary and is not linked to or a requirement of receiving social care services, which are assessed separately.

CHILD AND ADOLESCENT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES (CAMHS)

The CAMHS service provides a range of comprehensive, multidisciplinary, community mental health services for children and young people with mental health needs, and their parent's carers.

This may include mild to moderate emotional wellbeing concerns and mental health problems, as well as moderate, acute and severe, complex and/or enduring mental health problems or disorders that are causing significant impairments in their lives.

The Service includes:

- A Single Point of Access (SPA)
 Support to universal services.
- An integrated CAMHS provision delivering evidence based pathways and focused on outcomes known as Core CAMHS.
- Access to Crisis Intervention and Home Treatment 24 hours a day, seven day a week.
- A community based Eating Disorder service.
- Support to vulnerable groups including young people with a learning disability.
 Care and support though transition to adult services where needed.

Referral

All children and young people up to their 18th birthday who are resident and/or registered

with a GP within Lincolnshire can be referred to the Lincolnshire CAMHS provided:

> There are concerns about their mental health and/ or psychological wellbeing.

and

They have received support from professionals in universal services that has not helped to make a sufficient improvement.

or

Their problems are at a significant level the referrer feels they need immediate access to assessment and treatment from mental health professionals.

They do **NOT** accept referrals:

- 0 When a response for an immediate physical or medical health emergency is required (Contact Emergency services)
- A young person is displaying 0 behavioural problems but no other interventions have been tried with parents/carers and school in accordance with the 'Collaborative Lincolnshire Behaviour Pathway'.
- For the assessment, diagnosis of, 0 or review of medication for ADHD or for the diagnosis/ treatment of the Autism Spectrum Disorder

- (ASD), Tourette's Syndrome, 0 Dyslexia, Dyspraxia and other neurodevelopmental disorders of childhood.
- For the provision of purely physical O health and/or sexual health in isolation of a mental health need.
- For treatment of a substance misuse problem, however if there are coexisting mental health problems, these should be discussed with CAMHS through the Professional Advice Line.

CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES TEAM

Lincolnshire County Council's Children with Disabilities Team are part of the Special Education Need and Disability Service. The social work team provides a statutory service for children and young people with a severe and profound disability. Services may be available to those that are eligible after being subject of a social care assessment. EARLY YEARS AND CHILDCARE SUPPORT

Early Years and Childcare Support is committed to working in partnership with all Early Years providers, Early Years Locality Teams and professionals to achieve the highest standards of inclusive, quality early years provision for children and families. Early Years and Childcare Support seeks to provide a range of activities and services by working with all early years providers and the county's network of Children's Centres. which aim to improve parent and child attachment, child development, school readiness and the prevention of escalation to specialist services.

The government's Early Help offer recognises that preventing problems or interventions as soon as they are identified is essential to support the development and achievement of children. Well targeted early intervention is likely to lead to better outcomes or improve a child's resilience against poor outcomes. It is therefore critical that all Early Years providers across Lincolnshire are supported and challenged to provide outstanding inclusive, quality provision for Lincolnshire's youngest children in order that they all achieve 'good' outcomes at the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage and have the necessary skills to enable them to achieve their potential throughout school and their adult life. Early Years and Childcare Support work in partnership with the Early Years Locality teams to provide the following services that contribute to the Early Help offer;

Promoting and supporting the

identification of children aged 0-5 years with additional needs and disabilities in order to improve outcomes. This is implemented by Early Years Specialist Teachers working closely with SENCos to ensure early identification and intervention for children and their families.

Monitoring to ensure that effective early intervention and support for children and their families is provided in a timely manner. Support is given to settings to identify developmental delay in young children and provide additional support in a Children's Centre or an early years setting to help children catch up with their peers.

Providing support and advice to promote school readiness and a smooth transition into school, seeking to ensure that all children are 'school ready' and in a position to learn and achieve in a school setting. The key focus of the work is on the delivery of early intervention and transition groups to promote school readiness.

Services are available to all early years providers including early years settings, schools, childminders, Out of School clubs and within Children's Centres across Lincolnshire. Services can be accessed through the early years provision identified above, or on request by emailing EYCC@lincolnshire.gov.uk



EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY TEAM

Educational Psychologists in Lincolnshire are employed by Lincolnshire County Council to work with young people between the ages of 0 - 25, their teachers and their parents to help them make the most of learning opportunities.

Educational Psychologists work with those young people who have the most complex needs, for example autism, attachment issues, emotional wellbeing. An Educational Psychologist usually becomes involved with a child or young person when those working with that child in the pre-school setting or school feel puzzled about how to help them with their learning and development.

In order to find ways of helping children make progress, Educational Psychologists work with parents, teachers and other staff following the 'assess, plan, do, review' cycle as outlined in the SEN and Disability Code of Practice. They do this by talking with parents, teachers and other professionals about any concerns there might be about a young person's learning. They might also observe the young person working or playing at pre-school/school or at home. They might also talk to the young person and may work directly with him/her. They do all this to try to build a picture of strengths and interests and any difficulties the young person might be experiencing within school or pre-school.

The Educational Psychologist will use the information gathered in order to help teachers or parents to put together a plan to try to address the identified difficulties. The plan is likely to include targeted interventions

for the young person and may also include the delivery of training so that staff can become more skilled in meeting the young person's needs.

Educational Psychology Helpline

The Educational Psychology Team provide a helpline for parents and carers who are concerned about a particular issue relating to their child.

The helpline is staffed by one of the Educational Psychologists on a rota basis every Tuesday afternoon from 1.30pm until 4pm (except Christmas School holidays).

ESCO: EARLY SUPPORT AND CARE COORDINATION

Early Support Care Coordination (ESCO) is a targeted service provided by Lincolnshire County Council Children Services, Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Service.

Our Mission Statement: To provide early support for families and children and young people with special needs and disabilities to feel empowered, supported and have the opportunity to reach their potential through holistic key working, care coordination and information sharing.

ESCO provides early help provision for child and young people from 0-18 years of age, and is committed to improving the delivery of services for disabled children, young people and their families. It enables services to coordinate their activity better and provide families with a single point of contact and continuity through key working and face to face information sharing and signposting. ESCO ensures that service delivery is child, young person and family centred. It focuses on supporting services and practitioners to work in partnership with children, young people and their families.

ESCO provide the following services:

ESCO Care Coordination

Some families and young people may benefit from care coordination and a multi-agency plan with a Key Worker providing a single point of contact. To access care coordination requires an involved professional completing a Early Help Assessment form and logging the request with Lincolnshire Customer Service Centre on: 01522 782111. The Early Help Assessment is screened to determine if ESCO can support the unmet needs and then if appropriate a Key Worker from the ESCO team will visit the family at home to further explain about care coordination.

ESCO drop in clinics

The ESCO service facilitate drop in clinics across Lincolnshire. For many parents/ carers, having the opportunity to sit down with a knowledgeable professional for a brief consultation can be all that is required to enable them to navigate the system of services and identify local universal and targeted services for children with additional needs. An ESCO Dropin appointment provides the opportunity for parents/carers to meet with an ESCO Key Worker for a one hour session at a convenient Children's Centre. This service is available to all parents/carers of children who live in Lincolnshire, with a disability and/or additional need. Parents/carers can book a Drop-in appointment directly with Lincolnshire Customer Services Centre on: 01522 782111.

LIAISE (SEND INFORMATION, ADVICE AND SUPPORT SERVICE IN LINCOLNSHIRE)

Liaise provide free and confidential information, advice and support to parents of children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disability. The Service offers a service to children and young people as well as parents.

There is a confidential Helpline and families can meet advisers face to face at a venue that suits them.

The information, advice and support provided includes:

- SEND policy and how it works in practice locally
- O SEND legal information
- Gathering and understanding information on SEND
- O School admissions and exclusions
- Support with getting the views of children, young people or parents' views heard by schools, health providers, the Local Authority (this could include attending meetings or help writing letters or filling in forms)
- Support with raising complaints about health, education and care relating to SEND;
- Information, Advice and Support on Tribunals and Disagreement Resolution.
- Giving information about other organisations who could help

o including local Healthwatch, local and national charities; parent support groups.

Independent Support

Liaise will be working with a company called Core Assets to deliver Independent Support in Lincolnshire. Independent Supporters will give information and support to young people and parents of children who are going through the Education, Health and Care Plan process. They can also work with those who are converting from a Statement of SEN or a Learning Difficulty Assessment to an EHC Plan.

LINCOLNSHIRE COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES - CHILDREN'S THERAPY SERVICE

Each child is unique and individual, and will develop skills at different rates. If your child is having difficulty developing certain skills they may benefit from specialist assessment, support and advice from our service.

The Children's Therapy Service is an integrated team made up of Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, Speech and Language Therapists and Therapy Assistants. We provide specialist therapy services for children and young people, between the ages of 0 -19, to support them to achieve their potential. We work all across the county of Lincolnshire in a variety of locations.

How to refer

Speech & Language Therapy

We have an open referral system. This means that we accept referrals from any source including from parents, health visitors, preschools, nurseries, mainstream and special schools, paediatricians and GPs.

Occupational Therapy

The Children's Occupational Therapy Team requires a referral to be completed by a healthcare professional in order to be accepted; this includes health visitors, school nurses, GPs and paediatricians.

If you have any concerns regarding your child's development it is important to discuss this with the most relevant healthcare professional available to you. They will then

be able to organise a referral on your behalf.

Physiotherapy

The children's physiotherapy team requires a referral to be completed by a healthcare professional in order to be accepted; this includes Health Visitors, School Nurses, GPs and paediatricians.

If you have any concerns regarding your child's physical development it is important to discuss this with the most relevant healthcare professional available to you. They will then be able to organise a referral on your behalf.

If you child is under five and you have concerns regarding their development that you can't quite put your finger on, your health visitor will be able to register your child for an 'early intervention' appointment with us.

This is a screening appointment to help establish if your child requires further assessment and support from our service, or onward referral to other services for support.

PORTAGE

Portage is an educational home visiting service for pre-school children and their families.

Portage works in partnership with parents and their children, offering advice on, and structured strategies to tackle;

- Specific learning difficulties
- O Autism
- O Language and communication skills
- Physical disability
- Learning through play

Where appropriate your Portage Home Visitor will liaise with other services to support your child.

The Portage Co-ordinator will then contact the family and discuss the best options for the child.

In partnership with the family the Home Visitor will devise a programme of activities to tackle the specific difficulties, and to achieve successful developmental progress.

Referral

Referral from other professionals (Paediatrician, Educational Psychologist, Health Visitor, Speech and Language service). Parents may also refer their child to the Portage service themselves.

SENSORY EDUCATION AND SUPPORT TEAM (SEST)

The Sensory Education and Support Team (SEST) offers support and specialist teaching to children with a visual, Multi Sensory and Hearing Impairment. The service aims to ensure that children and young people with sensory impairment are able to access their educational environment and make progress in order to raise aspirations and maximise their development.

An initial assessment to provide a diagnosis must be made by a health professional before a referral takes place.

SHORT BREAKS

The Short Breaks Team are a service within Children's Services that plan and develop, in consultation with young people and their families, the Short Break Activities in Lincolnshire including Short Break subsidised holidays for families to have a break together.

Whilst the primary role is the care of children enjoying short breaks away from their families; care staff, area colleagues, schools and other agencies work together to maximise the benefits and opportunities of children and their families.

The short breaks services have been designed to enable children, young people and their families to enjoy breaks together, as well as enabling young people to enjoy activities independently in their community.

Short breaks come in a variety of formats and each one can last from just a few hours to a few days depending on the type of provision and the needs of the child or young person.

Short Breaks tackles isolation, provides access to leisure facilities, develops friendship networks, promotes personal development and promotes happiness and well-being for the child, young person and their family.

TRIPLE P - STEPPING STONES

Tripple P- Stepping stones is a parenting programme which is specifically for parents and carers of children with a disability aged 0-12 years. The programme offers a range of practical strategies to enable parents to teach their child new slills, develop and build strong and healthy relationships with their child.

This group is targeted for parents with a child aged 0-12 years old with a developmental disability. It can be extended to support young people up to the age of 15.

Triple P is a 9 week programme made up of:

- Five weekly 2 1/2 hour group sessions
- Three 20-30 minute individual telephone consultations
- O Final group and feedback session

Referral

Families can self refer on to this course at their local Children's centre.

Parents say:

UNITED LINCOLNSHIRE HOSPITALS NHS TRUST - SPECIALIST NURSE FOR CHILDREN WITH ADDITIONAL NEEDS/ COMPLEX DISABILITIES

This role has been developed to provide support and education to professionals, to support families who have children with additional needs/complex disabilities/Autism Spectrum Disorder.

A specialist service is offered to professionals working with children aged between 0-19 years, within the county of Lincolnshire.

Key aspects of the role are to:

- O Provide up to date information & signpost to appropriate services
- Provide a liaison service between CAMHS, Educational Psychologists, Community Paediatricians, and other Health, Education & Social Care Professionals as necessary, to provide a co-ordinated service
- O Provide training to promote "Autism Awareness" among professionals & increase understanding of Autism Spectrum Disorders
- Suggest & provide additional strategies to support and manage behaviours, promote sleep, continence and positive diet
- O Provide partnership training to parents of children with autism to support understanding and promote positive coping strategies
- Advisory/Support

Referral

In order for a referral to be made to this service, it is necessary that another professional from health, social care or education is already involved and co-ordinating support for the child and their family. This service provides additional specialist advice and support to maximise support offered to the family within the local area.

The Specialist Nurse for Children With Additional Needs/Complex Disabilities does not hold a caseload, but supports other professionals.

UNITED LINCOLNSHIRE HOSPITALS NHS TRUST - COMMUNITY NURSING

A specialist service is offered to school age children with severe learning disabilities and their families where there is an additional health need. These children may also have other conditions such as epilepsy, autism, ADHD. The community nurse will work with families at home or in a school setting to promote health, competence, choice and quality of life for children with severe and/or profound learning disabilities, to address areas of need and effect positive change. The main area of the service is delivered in Lincoln and surrounding areas.

This service liaises with Paediatricians, Psychiatrists, Psychologists and other health, education and social care professionals as necessary to provide a co-ordinated service.

Key aspects of the role:

- O General support to children and families through periods of developmental change or particular difficulty
- O Assessment and management of behaviour, continence, sleep, medications, specific conditions
- Monitoring of programmes, medication and health
- Promoting social, communication and self-help skills
- O Health promotion and selfprotection/sex education
- Ensuring appropriate referral for diagnostic assessment and/or treatment

- Teaching/advising the professionals and carers in primary care and acute settings, the voluntary sector and parents and carers
- O To engage others in improving the hospital experience for children with learning disabilities
- Facilitating groups for children and young people with learning disabilities, and their parents.

Referrals

Referrals can be accepted from GPs, other Health, Education, or Social Care Professionals & Parent/Carers can self-referral. Adequate information is required about the child and reason for referral, along with information that may reduce risks to the safety of nursing staff working alone. 



Nationally - Action for Children is a UK children's charity committed to helping the most vulnerable and neglected children and young people break through injustice, deprivation and inequality, so they can achieve their full potential.

Locally – We have been delivering various services to disabled children and their families in Lincolnshire since 1988.

Our Short break services really make a difference to children and young people who have multiple and complex disabilities, as well as Autism Spectrum Conditions and/or sensory impairments and their families.

Our goal is to ensure that disabled children and young people have the same opportunities in life as their non-disabled peers. Our community and youth groups do just that, by helping children and young people to meet and make new friends whilst enjoying new opportunities and experiences in a safe and caring environment.

We let children decide what they want to do and work with them to make their wishes a reality. The approach is about being inclusive, flexible and, above all fun.

We know from experience that families of disabled children are more likely to experience family breakup, but short breaks can reduce family stress and prevent families from reaching crisis point. It's about enhancing emotional wellbeing, building resilience and improving life chances.

Our project office is based in the City of Lincoln; however we deliver services all over the county of Lincolnshire. Our community and youth group sessions are held in fixed locations in each district however the buddying service is arranged to be held wherever the support is required.

Referral

Anyone can make a direct referral to any of our services, by telephoning or e-mailing the office

Once a referral has been allocated to a coordinator they will contact the family to gather further information to see how they can meet the child/young persons and families needs.

Our short break services take place in the evenings and at weekends, as this is the time when children and young people are available to access them.

KIDS

We work with and support children and young people from birth to the age of 25 who are disabled, that is they have a physical, sensory or mental impairment (including mental illness) which in interaction with social, attitudinal and environmental constraints, creates barriers which hinder their full and equal participation in society.

This falls into three streams:

Early Years

Early Years is about working with babies and young children from birth to five and includes encouraging children to play together and have fun while also promoting motor skills and communication development as well as supporting parents to help them develop skills in caring for the needs of their child.

School Years

These services focus on children of school age. They can be educationally based, purely play and leisure activities or a combination of both. Some also focus on providing respite for the family which can relieve the strain on the family and reduce stress on parents while giving the child or young person an opportunity to get away from the family home, enjoy new experiences.

Transition into adulthood

KIDS' transitions services directly support young disabled people to make the transition from adolescence to adulthood: a time when a lot of the support they are able to receive may be coming to an end.




